Message from the Village President,

The Village recently received two grants to assist with Land Use Planning, so the Plan Commission, with citizen help, will be busy updating the Village's Comprehensive Land Use Plan in 2011. Public meetings will be scheduled so residents can weigh in with ideas, comments and concerns. Look for more information about these events via e-mail bulletins and the Village website.

The Village participates in the *Illinois Jobs Now!* Capital Program. The funding for this program was deemed illegal in one appellate court recently, but we are hopeful the state will find a way to fund this program. The Village is scheduled to receive approximately \$300,000 for road infrastructure through Fiscal Year (FY) 2012 from *Illinois Jobs Now!*, as well as approximately \$700,000 from Motor Fuel Tax Funds and Road and Bridge Funds. The Public Works Committee is currently formulating their recommendation for the 2011 road maintenance plan.

The Finance Committee is working on the 2012FY Budget, which runs from May 1, 2011 to April 30, 2012. The Village just learned the 2010 Census places our current population at 11,131. This number represents a 17% decrease from our previous population, which included those who disconnected from the Village, vacant homes due to foreclosure and those who, like me, have college age or older children who left home and were not replaced by new babies. Our population number is instrumental in estimating Village revenues. Due to the recent State income tax rate increase, municipalities will receive 6% of the total collected, when it previously collected 10%. Despite the 4% reduction, this change is not supposed to reduce funding to municipalities. Since the end of December, the State has decreased the amount owed to the Village by \$330,027; the Village still has an Account Receivables from the State of \$247,235. We are hopeful the state's cash flow issues will continue to improve as the State receives additional revenues.

Recent newspaper coverage suggesting that the Village owed the County \$600,000 was incorrect. The County's comments were the result of last year's passage of Illinois House Bill 5011 requiring municipalities to report population changes when its borders change. This new law attempted to provide a mechanism for state shared revenues to be sent to the governing body providing services. This law requires municipalities to report the population of annexation and disconnection territories using census data from 2007 forward. This law is flawed because you cannot report the population using census data for disconnection and annexation territories; plus, it is questionable if the law could be enforced retroactively. U.S. Census data provides information by defined tracks and blocks and does not breakdown the number of people living in each household or subdivision. We informed the Governor's office of this issue, but unfortunately he signed the flawed bill anyway.

This winter we promoted Ann Dinges to Human Resource and Accreditation Manager. Ms. Dinges will continue to perform the Administrative Assistant duties until someone has been hired to take over those duties. In an effort to be fiscally responsible, we are waiting to finalize our FY12 Budget before hiring additional employees. Intern Megan Abel worked for several weeks at Village Hall over her break and high school student Christine Slade continues to work for the Village several hours a week. This winter the Village also hired a consultant, Christine Martin, to draft a Records Management Plan for the Village to follow. Ms. Martin has been helpful in getting the Village records better organized for easy access information and preparing a plan that will define state mandated retention requirements for Village documents. What is Economic Development?

When the Village adopted its first Comprehensive Land Use Plan (Comp Plan) in November 2007, the Route 47 Corridor and the Wasco area were not analyzed because we knew these two areas would need additional planning. To help with that effort, an Economic Development Committee (EDC) was formed in April 2009 and was requested to aid the Plan Commission by making a recommendation related to the Wasco area. Last year this group began their evaluation and will be formalizing a recommendation to the Plan Commission this spring. The Plan Commission will be hosting public meetings seeking your input to clarify our residents' vision for Wasco, as well as the rest of the Village. The Economic Development Committee will also be evaluating information related to ways the Village might assist Village businesses.

Plans Complete & Available for viewing

The purpose of the **Illinois 47 Corridor Planning Study** is to provide municipalities and other government agencies with an understanding of the planning challenges associated with growth and to recommend strategies or tools that can be used to address these challenges in the vicinity of Route 47. Land Planning Grants

The Green Infrastructure Report, funded by a \$2,500 grant from the Sustainable Watershed Action Team (SWAT) and the Chicago Wilderness alliance has been completed. The Report was presented to the Plan Commission who will be making a recommendation to the Village Board as to whether the Village should adopt it as part of the Village's Comprehensive Land Use Plan.

The Village would like to take this opportunity to thank the Village/Township Joint Environment Resource Management Committee, Chicago Wilderness, Deanna Glosser and SWAT, The Conservation Design Forum, Nancy Williams of the Illinois Department of Natural Resources and especially Trotter and Associate environmental engineer, Rob Linke, who drafted the report. The maps produced will be an invaluable tool in guiding the Plan Commission and Village Board as to the location and importance of natural resources within our area.

We recently learned that the Village received two additional land planning grants to help with its Comprehensive Land Use Plan. The Village received a \$10,000 matching grant from Kane County's Small Cities Grant funded by Riverboat money and a \$20,000 grant from SWAT/Chicago Wilderness alliance, both payable over a two-year period and also funded by River Boat money.

The Plan Commission will be hosting public meetings seeking community input to help with our Village's Comprehensive Land Use Plan. Look for e-bulletins and refer to the Village website about upcoming meeting dates and plan on attending to make your voice heard.

The Plan Commission also applied for a Local Technical Assistance grant for land planning help from the Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning (CMAP).

2010 Road Construction Report

Last summer the Village continued repaving Village roads. Some of you may not be aware how the Village funds road projects and it is important to understand the relationship between the Village, the State, the Kane/Kendall Council of Government (COG), and the Campton Township Highway District.

The State gives each municipality a portion of the Motor Fuel Taxes collected at the gas pump to maintain roads within its jurisdiction. These funds are the state's funds and require each municipality to follow spending guidelines. The Village also works with the Kane/Kendall Council of Mayors (COM), which is charged with administering Federal Funds allocated for road projects within our region. The Village President is a voting member of this Council and a member of the Transportation Policy Committee. The COM approved the American Recovery and Reinvestment (ARRA) funds that paid for the majority of the McDonald Road repaving. In Plato Township, McDonald Road was the only road eligible for federal funds, which is why it was repaved before other Plato Township roads such as Lenz or Kendall Roads.

This October the Village received over \$58,000 from the first installment of the \$500 million *Illinois Jobs Now!* capital program. These funds are for use on local roads and, subject to pending litigation, the Village is scheduled to receive a total of \$300,000 through 2012. The amount distributed to municipalities is much higher than that distributed to township highway districts, which once again proves why it is financially advantageous to be incorporated.

Soon after incorporating, the Village entered into an Intergovernmental Agreement with the Campton Township Highway District to maintain the Village roads located within Campton Township. That agreement states that the Village will return any lost revenue, due to incorporating, as long as the Highway District agreed to continue maintaining Village roads within Campton Township.

The Village entered into a separate agreement with the Campton Township Highway District for maintaining Village roads located in Plato Township. Public Works Chairman Dave Newkirk and Village President Patsy Smith work closely with Campton Township Highway District Commissioner Sam Gallucci to prioritize road maintenance projects.

The Public Works Committee is working on a long-term maintenance plan to be implemented for the 2011 construction season. In an effort to efficiently use municipal funds, the Village negotiated a ten-year Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) between the Plato Township Highway District, the City of Elgin and the Campton Township Highway District for snow removal for roads located in Plato Township.

2011 Blizzard

We want to thank residents for their patience during the recent blizzard. The Village received over 23" of snow in a 24 hour period and all snow plowing was shut down from 10:00p.m. Tuesday night until early Wednesday morning due to low visibility and high winds. Despite stuck snowplows and equipment breakdowns, the Campton Township Highway District overall did an excellent job of getting us dug out by Wednesday night. Commissioner Gallucci has already announced a plan to acquire additional equipment and personnel for next winter.

Our police department was also busy and rescued several people stranded in vehicles on Route 47 and assisted numerous motorists during the blizzard.

Create the Future of Campton Hills

The Village of Campton Hills is embarking on a two-year process to update its Comprehensive Plan. The Comprehensive Plan is a Village policy and planning document that identifies community values, establishes policies and strategy to guide the future development of the community, and provide a coordinated approach to Village decision-making regarding land use and improvement. As such, the Comprehensive Plan is one of the primary tools used by the Village of Campton Hills Plan Commission and the Village Board to make decisions that affect the future of the community.

The focus of the Comprehensive Plan is primarily to establish relatively broad, long-term goals, objectives, policies, and implementation recommendations that will provide the framework for ongoing community planning, development, and improvement. The Plan will assess existing conditions and trends, and provide recommendations for the use and development of land, the extension and improvement of transportation services and infrastructure, the development of the Village's economic base, historic preservation, and natural resources including agricultural land, water resources, natural areas, and green infrastructure.

There will be a number of opportunities throughout this process for you to participate in the development of the Comprehensive Plan. The first of these opportunities, a community kick-off meeting, will take place during the next two months. However, to get the process rolling, we are interested in hearing from you about your vision, thoughts, and ideas concerning the future of Campton Hills by taking the short survey below.

**Background Referendum Question No. 1
Municipal Electric Aggregation
(Bulk Purchase of Electricity)**

Public Act 096-0176 (20 ILCS 3855/1-92) allows municipalities and counties whose residents approve a binding referendum to solicit bids for electricity. The referendum above is only "advisory" and the Village Board wants to know if voters would like the Village Board to place a "binding" referendum on the ballot in 2012, which if passed, would allow the municipality to arrange for the supply of electricity for customers. If the voters were to approve a "binding" referendum in 2012, the Village would negotiate rates for all residents, except those who "opted" out of the program. Northern Illinois Municipal Electric Cooperative (NIMEC) represents 140 municipal and other government entities that "band together to drive down pricing." When government entities work together, they expect to be able to leverage the higher volume and negotiate lower pricing from suppliers. In 1996, Illinois deregulated electrical power purchases and about 75 percent of the commercial load is purchased from suppliers other than ComEd and Ameren, according to NIMEC. Residential customers don't usually change providers because until 2009, they had to "opt in" to the program and many suppliers didn't pursue individual accounts due to the cost of marketing and setting up residential billing systems. In 2009, the "opt out" option became available when the state legislature passed HB0722 allowing municipalities and counties whose electors approve allowing negotiations on their behalf. The electricity would continue to be delivered over ComEd transmission lines and ComEd would still be responsible for line maintenance, repair and restoration of service. This system would work much like the current Solid Waste Districts that negotiate the contract on behalf of Township residents for the disposal of garbage. The Village is always looking for ways to save residents money and the ability to negotiate for discounted electricity is one way to do so.

**Background Referendum Question No. 2
Investigating the Formation of a Village Fire Department**

The Fox River & Countryside Fire/Rescue District (FRCFRD), formerly the St. Charles Countryside Fire Protection District, will sever ties with the City of St. Charles beginning May 1, 2011. Currently, the FRCFRD is a paper district and the City of St. Charles provided contract services for the last 40 years. The Village comprises 30% of the area of the FRCFRD and the FRCFRD serves 50% of the Village; four other fire protection districts (Elburn, South Elgin, Pingree Grove and Burlington) serve the remaining 50% of the Village. At the November 4, 2010 election, 53% of the voters approved an advisory referendum asking whether the FRCFRD should seek a 10-cent tax increase to maintain current levels of fire protection. Sixty-seven percent of the voters stated they did not want a reduction in service. The FRCFRD chose not to put on the April 5, 2011 ballot a binding referendum question seeking a \$0.10 per \$100 of assessed valuation increase. The FRCFRD has purchased equipment, plans to contract staffing and build two fire stations. They applied to become a member of Mutual Aid Box Alarm System (MABAS), a statewide mutual aid response system for fire and emergency services. MABAS agencies agree to send pre-determined resources, without reservation, to assist a stricken community. "Automatic Aid" agreements between two fire districts or communities provide first-alarm response assistance to fire departments automatically. It appears equipment and staffing available to the FRCFRD will be limited. To date, no Auto Aid Agreements have been executed. Because equipment and staffing available to FRCFRD will be limited, the FRCFRD may be unable to procure the needed assistance from neighboring communities. It is for this reason, the Village Board wants to know if the Village should investigate the formation of a Village Fire Department in an effort to continue the current level, or possibly better level, of EMS and Fire Protection Services.



Residential Trash Issues?

The Village receives a number of calls about trash disposal and we are happy to assist when we can, but it is important for Village residents to understand that this service is not under the Village's jurisdiction. Both Campton and Plato Townships have Solid Waste Districts that negotiate a contract for their constituents. Waste Management has the contract for both Districts, but the contracts are different.

Many governmental bodies have stopped publishing and mailing newsletters to help balance their budgets.
